Austin's WearABLEs sells quality handcrafted beaded jewelry designed and created by Austin Wear. Austin is a young adult with autism. Making beaded jewelry is immensely beneficial to him, those who wear it, and the organizations that receive a portion of all jewelry sales.

In 2016 by chance, Austin made a beaded bracelet. Immediately he was drawn to this activity that uses creativity, making patterns, and counting. Making beaded bracelets morphed into a behavior management strategy to help with the challenges of autism and diagnosed OCD.

Beading has not only helped him manage anxiety, which triggers severe behaviors, but it has given him purpose and dignity. In 2019, Austin's mother founded Austin's WearABLE Art and began selling his products online and directly to customers. In 2021, FIDGETS were added to the catalog. Along with fidgets we sell a limited number of "boredom buster" activities and a few products to help gain independent living skills.
